Subject: Smart History, the Center for Public Art History

While developing material for the frame gallery's various <u>newsletters</u>, I have discovered a lot of useful information, information that I have tried to pass along to our readers in an interesting format. For example, while researching the newsletter on *Provenance* (2022 Newsletter #22-4), I attempted to increase our understanding of both provenance and to some degree The International Foundation for Art Research (IFAR). Then, while developing material for the newsletter on *Podcasts* (2023 Newsletter #23-1), we learned about the Getty Trust Podcasts. Through the magic of a <u>hyperlink</u> I was able to connect our readers to the Getty website, which contains a <u>list of 191 of their podcasts</u>.

In this newsletter supplement I want to introduce you to a resource called *Smart History, The Center for Public Art History.* This is how they present themselves:

"... a tiny not-for-profit, with support from our academic contributors, as well as <u>major foundations and donors</u>, has become the most visited art history resource in the world."

Smart History offers what they call a "textbook": **Reframing Art History**. The textbook they refer to is actually not a text "book"; it is an <u>on-line resource</u>. They describe their textbook in these words:

"Reframing Art History, an open-access multimedia art history "textbook," gives you a guided journey through the living, breathing, meaningful side of art history. We're less concerned with names and dates than with meaning and movement. With chapters developed by a group of more than 50 experts, it showcases art and history from the bottom up."
